(Old generation accepts nature as it is – New generation prefers to remove the disturbing elements in nature.)

27. Explain the suitability of the title 'Doves on the wing'.

(The child's confusion – Theme – Game at multiple levels)

28. Attempt a paragraph on the life, occupation and mannerisms of the people of Azores.
 (Uneducated – Poor – lazy – ignorant – liars – donkey rides)

29. What impression do you get of the flower girl (Eliza, before her transformation in Act I of Pygmalion in the covent garden scene ?

(Eliza, the flower girl – uncivilized – crude ridiculous language – Poor)

B. Answer any two questions from 30 to 32. Each carries 6 scores. $(2 \times 6 = 12)$

30. Compare the issues presented in the poems 'Africa' and 'Million Man March'.

(Experience of African people – Preservation of culture – Bitter experiences in the past – The tone of protest – Expression of hope)

- 31. How does the story 'Lt. Aaaron eats his hat' give a lively and energetic picture of local townships Dilshan and Deewar ? (Neighbouring towns of Dilshan and Deewar the rivalry Manohar Ram, a business man turned politician the close knit family relationships the active group of children the game of kabbadi Lt. Aaron with his military stories)
- 32. How did the evolution of printing press help the evolution of English ? Name some writers who enriched English language.

(Fixing English spellings and printing books in large numbers – Chaucer, William Shakespeare, John Milton, Dr. Johnson, Wordsworth, Coleridge)

Answer any two questions from 33 to 35. Each carries 8 scores. $(2 \times 8 = 16)$

33. How is the permanence of nature contrasted with the lethargy of man in 'Wild Swans at Coole' ?

(Poet takes a walk in Coole park during autumn – the swans swimming in the lake – had seen the swans nineteen years back – very energetic then – even now – saddened by the loss of his youth – he in his autumn of his life – Swans still in spring – still passionate – dull life and attitude of the poet – Proper imageries and expressions.)

34. The poem 'No More Hiroshimas' presents a gallery of anti-war visuals. Analyse.

(Medicines to cure atomic after effect – The river remains unchanged refusing rehabilitation – The junk after atomic bomb explosion – faded and broken kewpie dolls and models tricked with glitter – commercialised – stunted trees, dead brown lawns, children's monuments, stopped watches, torn shirts, twisted buttons etc.)

35. Explain how the flower girl is transformed into a lady and the role of other characters in making her sophisticated.

(Eliza, the flower girl – uncivilized – role of other characters in moudling her – changes manners and mode of speech – civilized – fashionable – independent)
